

Storing and Transporting Firearms

Storage Guidelines

1. **Licensing:** All firearm owners must possess and be able to present a valid license to a police officer upon request:
 - Firearms Permit + Firearms certificate – Czech shooters
 - European Firearms Passport – EU citizens + owners of this passport
 - Firearms Way Bill - “Non – EU citizens”
2. **Safekeeping:** When not in use, unloaded firearm should be securely stored in a dedicated gun safe.
3. **No Safe Available:** When not in use and if no safe is available, unloaded firearm should be with the permit holder (gun owner) at all times.

The best way to store the firearm is to keep it with you as much as is reasonable. When leaving a firearm in a hotel room when you are gone for breakfast, dinner, or on a trip, it is best to lock it in the firearm case if possible and to place it out of sight in a closet or under the bed. If possible, lock parts of the firearm (bolt, bolt carrier) to the safe or carry the parts with you so that it won't be easy to get access to a complete firearm.

Ammunition cannot be stored in the same case as the firearm. Ammunition may be kept in the same safe.

It is still true that the best way is to keep the weapon under supervision at all times!!!

Transportation Guidelines

1. **Licensing:** During transport, all firearm owners must possess and be able to present a valid license to a police officer upon request:
 - Firearms Permit + Firearms certificate – Czech shooters
 - European Firearms Passport – EU citizens + owners of this passport
 - Firearms Way Bill - “Non – EU citizens”
2. **Carrying:** The unloaded firearm should always be carried by the owner or license holder in a case or bag specifically designed for firearm storage and transport.

Avoid: Carrying a loaded firearm. Never leave the firearm unattended during transport. Ensure the firearm is always within reach/sight of the license holder, especially during stops.

Gun Storage on the shooting ranges is NOT available.
